
John SMALE - buried 5th June 1818 Mary Ann SMALE - buried 13th April 1812

John Smale was buried in the Dissenters' Graveyard on 5th June 1818 aged 45.¹ He had written his will earlier that year leaving to his "dear and beloved wife" all his household furniture, plate, linen, china, printed books and pictures. His brother William and his sisters Mary, the wife of Walter Friend of Holsworthy, Ann Smale, Susannah, the wife of John Tarr of Moretonhampstead, and Elizabeth Smale were to receive five pounds each "as a token of my brotherly regard". The sum of £1200 was put in the hands of his trustees, William Benjamin Kennaway and Charles Bowring, so that his son, also called John, could complete his education and be provided with a situation as an apprentice.²

No baptism has been found for John Smale but his age at death implies a birth date of around 1773. Tracing the lives of his siblings indicates that they were the children of Robert Smale, a serge-maker, and Mary Germon, who had married in Moretonhampstead in 1768.³

John had moved to Exeter by 1803 when he was recorded on a list of those eligible to serve in the Militia. He was then living in Holy Trinity parish and working as a fuller.⁴

On 29th April 1804 John Smale married Ann Mardon at Holy Trinity church in Exeter.⁵ Ann had also come from Moretonhampstead and was the daughter of John Mardon.

John and Ann lived in Holloway Street, Exeter and their first child, John, was born on 16th January 1805 and baptised at Bow Meeting on 17th February. Five years later they had a daughter, **Mary Ann**, who was born on 14th August 1810 and baptised at Bow Meeting on 9th September. Mary Ann died aged 20 months and was buried in the Dissenters' Graveyard on 13th April 1812.⁷

John's widow Ann survived him by over twenty years, dying aged 65 in January 1839. The *North Devon Journal* reported her death:

"On the 1^{st} inst., at No.6 Baring-Place, Exeter the residence of her only son, Mrs Ann Smale, aged 65, relict of the late Mr. John Smale, of Holloway-Street."

John and Ann's son John was educated at Manchester College in York, which was a dissenting academy. Returning to Exeter he trained as a solicitor and was an articled clerk to William Bowring from 1823 until Bowring's death in 1827, after this he was articled to George Ponsford Luke. He then studied at the Inner Temple and was called to the Bar in 1842. He was a partner in the firm of Messrs Tyrell, Barton and Smale in Exeter for several years and was appointed Attorney General for Hong Kong in 1860, becoming Chief Justice there in 1866. He was knighted in 1874 and died in London in 1882 and was buried in Highgate Cemetery.




John Smale (senior) had four sisters and a brother as mentioned in his will; Susannah, Elizabeth (usually referred to as Eliza), Ann, William and Mary.

Susannah was baptised at Cross Meeting, Moretonhampstead in 1781¹¹ and married John Tarr (also known as John Torr) on 4th October 1817 at St Martin's church, Exeter. The witnesses were her brother John and sister Eliza.¹² John Torr was an ironmonger when they married but later became a farmer at Wreyland, when he died in 1870 he was styled as a gentleman. Susannah died in 1866 and was buried at the Cross Street Chapel in Moretonhampstead. The inscription on her gravestone reads:

"To the memory of Susanna daughter of the late Robert Smale of Moreton, and the wife of John Torr of Wreyland. Died at Wreyland $1^{\rm st}$ April 1866 aged 84. Also of the above named John Torr who died at Wreyland on the $26^{\rm th}$ March 1870 aged 80." ¹³

They had one son, John Smale Torr, who was born in 1818. He was articled as a clerk to his cousin John Smale in 1834, then moved to London and practised as a solicitor there. He married twice and one of his sons, Cecil Torr, was the author of "Small Talk at Wreyland".

Elizabeth (or Eliza) Smale was baptised on 1st December 1785 at Cross Meeting, Moretonhampstead. During the 1820's she was the proprietor of a pastry shop and confectioners adjacent to Broadgate in Exeter's Cathedral Yard. ¹⁴

In the 1820s it was proposed that Broadgate be taken down; the local newspapers printed many letters on the subject including this one in the *Exeter Flying Post* on 31st July 1823 which mentions Eliza Smale's shop:



"Mr. Editor

In contemplating the result of the improvements now making in the streets of the city of Exeter, none affords more gratification than the intended enlargement of the opening from the High-street into the Cathedral-yard, at Broadgate, and it is to be hoped that the line of buildings on the southern side will be made from the corner of Mr. Cox's shop, to meet the City Bank close within the gate house, making a parallel line on the opposite side against Messrs. Clark and Smale's premises, leaving the space not less than 23 or 24 feet wide between the houses, whereof 4 feet on each side to be footways, and the residue, 15 or 16 feet, for horse and carriage way, by which plan the front shop of Mr. Clark's will not be affected, and probably some equivalent may remain of Miss Smale's premises that might be given up for what would require to be cut away from Clark's back rooms. Another grand object would be hereby obtained—a view of St. Peter's Cathedral from the High-street, which would be less conspicuous, if the, opening is contracted at Cox's corner, and if the whole of Smale's front towards the yard is not thrown open to the street. If the front of Mr. Cox's house was cut back in a line with Mr. Lee's, it would be a further improvement.

The business was taken over in the late 1820s by Sarah Mardon, who married James Murch in 1833. It continued to be run by their family into the 20th Century, becoming Tinley's in the 1930's and is now (2024) a branch of Pizza Express.¹⁷ There may have been a family connection between Eliza Smale and Sarah Mardon; Sarah was born in Moretonhampstead in 1795 and it is possible that her father, George, was a brother of John Smale's wife Ann Mardon.

Eliza Smale died on 24th March 1840; her death was reported in the *Western Times* on 4th April: "On the 24th ult., at Moretonhampstead, after a lingering illness, aged 54, Miss Eliza Smale, formerly of the Cathedral Yard, in this City, confectioner, and youngest daughter of the late Mr. Robert Smale, of the former place, sergemaker."¹⁸

Ann Smale, who was baptised at Cross Meeting, Moretonhampstead on 4th February 1779 and her brother William (who was born c1774 but for whom no baptism has been found) seem not to have married and to have spent most of their lives in Moretonhampstead. In 1851 they were living together in Forder Street; William was a retired farmer.¹⁹ William died on 15th January 1855 and Ann on 2nd January 1865; they were buried at Cross Street Chapel.²⁰

Mary Smale married Walter Friend, who was a watchmaker and silversmith, on 6th February 1801 at Holsworthy²¹ and they had nine children. Mary died aged 46 in 1820 and was buried at Cross Street Chapel, Moretonhampstead.²²
